This Sunday's message, ...,is all about Blindness and Sight. Contrasting previous blindness with the sight of faith — the metaphor is ancient (Plato's cave) and takes us beyond religion only. We all have blind spots, some minor, others not so minor. Usually, it takes some event to trigger the recognition that we are not seeing with 20:20 vision. The same can be true at the level of faith. Perhaps we could make our own the request of Bartimaeus: Let me see again!

Take time today to contemplate ... Just think of what he did: he threw aside his old cloak, got up, and ran to Jesus. The old cloak may be a symbol for his past, his darkness, his despair. He made an act of hope-filled faith, and Jesus did not disappoint him. All attempts of the bystanders to silence him made him more determined. He was clear about what he wanted, and knew who could help him. Bartimaeus has a lesson for us all, here and now. The persistence in asking, the boldness to ask, unmindful of the struggles that tend to suppress us, clarity of mind, simplicity, child-like faith and so on and on.

Opening Prayer Have pity on us, God our Saviour. Grant us grace and courage to cast off our sins and turn to you for healing. Show us in Christ the sure path of salvation and strengthen us to follow gladly in the way of the gospel. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen.

> Reflection: Asleep in Jesus, Blessed Sleep! As we approach the month of November, with the whole church, we turn our thoughts and prayers to our beloved dead; our loved ones gone before us marked with the sign of faith. The book of wisdom makes clear to us the reason for the Christian faith and the hope we have for our beloved dead. For the book of Wisdom says, "their going looked like a disaster...but they are in peace...for grace and mercy await those God has chosen." But we know that for some souls, we bank on God's mercy for their liberation and eternal redemption. Therefore, 2 Maccabees 12,46 advises "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins."

> On hope, it is our hope that our beloved dead are in a better place freed from all pains and sufferings; that they are now with God where they enjoy eternal life of peace, joy and thankfulness in the beatific vision of God's glory. Christ is the way to this eternal life of peace, joy thankfulness, He is the truth and the life and no one can come to the Father except through Him. Where He has gone we hope to follow. We firmly believe that your prayers and the masses we celebrate for them will help them secure the forgiveness of their sins and the eternal rest of their souls.

> However, we know that we do not always act and speak rightly and nothing imperfect will stand in the presence of God. This is where mercy comes in. We rely on the mercy of God who is full of mercy and compassion and who desires us for himself. Since those who are yet to gain entrance into the presence of God are helpless, they depend entirely on us through our prayers, masses, sacrifices and charitable works for their release, hence throughout the month of November we shall be praying at masses and engaging in acts of self-denials for their eternal repose. We also hope that by living his commands, we will one day reach the heavenly homeland to be with God and our loved ones again forever. Jesus has actually shown us that life means more than this earthly existence; that in fact life will continue beyond death where it reaches full expression in the vision of God's glory in heaven.

> While the spirituality of All Saints is jubilatory, that of the commemoration of All the Faithful departed is soberly reflective and based entirely on our unflinching hope in eternal life and the mercy of God. Eternal rest grant unto them o Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen. Fr. Gregory
