This Sunday, ..., both our first reading and the gospel strongly call us to uphold the sanctity of marriage and family life. They both remind us that marriage is instituted by God to benefit the human family. Like every desirable good, it must be cherished and protected. However, lust like every worthy vocation, marriage has its own challenges but these challenges are surmountable through God's grace and good Christian virtues. When and where these challenges occur, efforts should be made to resolve them mutually and with godly intent to make amends. Divorce might seem a right and fast solution. However, it is not always the case. Today's readings remind us that it is not the will of God for any sacramental marriage to be broken: "This is why a man must leave his father and mother, and join himself to his wife, and they become one body. So, what God had united, man must not divide." Marriage is not a commodity or an article, it is a Sacrament and sacred institution.

At this mass, we sincerely sympathize with and pray for all those going through difficult times in their marriages. We pray that God will give them the grace, strength, and wisdom to move forward and find peace in their homes. We also pray that those intending to be united in this Holy Sacrament, through the grace of God, may find fulfilment in love.

<u>Take time today to contemplate</u>..., The gospels are clear that although Jesus has a vision for human relationships, including within marriage, he did not condemn those who fell short of that vision. For instance, Mark in his gospel gives us a story about children, about parents bringing children to Jesus for him to bless them. Marriage between a man and a woman is a tried and tested way in which children can grow up to be loved, as well as being given stability and security. No other setting has been proven better for the nourishing and flourishing of children. If society cares about children, it will channel financial and professional resources into supporting marriage, understood as a communion of faithful love between a man and a woman, the fullest expression in human form of the communion of love between the Lord and us.

<u>Opening Prayer:</u> Creator God, in Christ you call man and woman to the fullness of glory for which you created them in your image. Heal our hardened hearts, renew our obedience to your spoken will, and conform our lives to your gracious design. Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen. <u>Introduction to the Scripture Readings:</u> *Genesis 2:18-24* — Includes the second creation story given in the Bible: we are taught here that man and woman are meant to be together. *Hebrews 2:9-11* — On most Sundays between now and the feast of Christ the King, the second reading will be from the Letter to the Hebrews. This was written about AD 80, to show the people of the time that Jesus fulfilled the needs of Jews and Greeks alike. *Mark 10:2-16* — Jesus instructs his followers about family life, repeating the teaching given in Genesis and telling all to be as trustful as little children.

Pope Francis: "I learned to pray from my grandmother. She is the one who taught me to pray and also instilled in me a devotion to Saint Joseph. Then, the spiritual fathers I had, both in the seminary and in the Society of Jesus, helped me grow in my experience of prayer. How does prayer happen? How do we get used to praying? What should we do when there is consolation or even desolation, when we don't feel like praying? He was a teacher of spiritual life for me. Over time, my formation in prayer has remained the same. Even as Pope, nothing has changed: I pray as I always have, with the same rhythm. Sometimes I say vocal prayers, sometimes before the Blessed Sacrament, I endure moments of dryness. My prayer continues through beautiful things and not-so-beautiful things. Sometimes I think I need to pray more, that's true. There's no time, but I need to pray more. I always stick to the Liturgy of the Hours; I never abandon it: in the afternoon, Vespers; later, the Office of Readings; in the morning, Lauds; and then Mass. And then there's mental prayer, the prayer of meditation; when I have a little time, I try to have a conversation and ask the Lord something, but I fear He might respond...And then there's the Our Father, the prayer of Jesus. It has everything! And there are prayers to Mary: I also have great trust in the Madonna; I always pray the Rosary. I like to feel her close because she is a Mother and she guides us.
